

BAY CREEK NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATION PLANNING & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE (P&ED) Grocery Store Survey Results

P&ED conducted a survey of South Madison neighbors asking about shopping behaviors and preferences along S Park St, and opinions regarding the proposed grocery store at 1402 S Park St. The survey was open from July 27 through August 24, 2018 and 343 neighbors participated. Below is a summary of the responses.




The majority of South Madison neighbors shop for groceries on South Park St more than 5 times a month.

2. What portion of your groceries and household supplies do you purchase on South Park Street?




The majority of South Madison neighbors purchase at least half of their groceries on South Park St.



3. Assess the importance of each of the following reasons why you DON'T shop for groceries on S Park Street currently.


The majority of South Madison neighbors think that product selection is the most important factor for not shopping along S Park St currently.

4. Assess the importance of each of the following reasons for deciding where you DO shop for groceries.




The majority of South Madison neighbors think that quality of products, product selection, and convenience are most important when determining where to shop for groceries.

5. Within the past month, where did you buy groceries and household supplies most frequently?



6. What form of transportation do you use for the majority of your grocery shopping trips?




The majority of South Madison neighbors use a car when shopping for groceries.



7. For your household, how would the lack of a full-service grocery store on S Park St during the development and construction of the 1402 site impact your access to food.


The majority of South Madison neighbors' access to food will be impacted by the lack of a fullservice grocery store during the construction of 1402 site.

10. What neighborhood do you live in? What would you do if there were no full-service grocery on Park St?

- Continue to shop at the Willy Street Co-op, where we currently do our shopping. We would likely only change our shopping habits if the Willy Street Co-op opened branch on South Park Street
- Sorry for the neighborhood
- It would have a small impact as I only shop there when need a last-minute item not available at one of the other smaller specialty stores in the Park St area
- Rely on delivery services and (since I work on campus) fill in the gaps via Madison Fresh Market on University.
- Travel
- waste more time and money by going further away to shop
- Buy at the next closest grocery store and maybe be forced to drive instead of bicycle for our groceries. I hope we do not become a food desert.
- I would keep shopping where I currently shop, Willy Street.
- Continue shopping where I already do, on the University Avenue corridor west of Campus or on the East Washington/Williamson Street Corridor.
- We mostly shop at Willy Street Co-op, and usually the one in Middleton because it's on the way home from work, so it wouldn't affect our household. However, I have concerns on food accessibility for others who live near the grocery store and rely on it for food.
- Travel to a different neighborhood grocery store
- Drive to a grocery
- We would do more of our shopping at more distant grocery stores. It would be less convenient, and we would be less likely to make short trips for just a few items. We'd have to plan ahead more to make sure we don't run out of things at inconvenient times.
- Starve to death
- Although we probably go to Willy Street Co-op, HyVee, or Trader Joes more often, Pick n Save is the place where we get 100% of our spontaneous late night snack purchases, or that one thing for a recipe after already starting cooking. Since we don't really use a car much, and it hardly seems worth it to go to Cap Center Market late at night or to get one thing, we would probably just make do without. The gas station has us covered for candy bars and gatorade, but not on fruit or spices or anything remotely healthy.
- Be sad
- Its impact would be detrimental to my life, one, because I work there, and two, because I have immediate family members who I always help out by getting them groceries after nearly every shift I work.
- Use delivery
- I would probably have to move to where a store is nearby and I can't afford to at my age or income.
- Go to Woodmans or Willy St Coop or TJs
- Drive to Fitchburg
- Continue shopping at Willy St. Coop and Trader Joe
- Drive to Festival Foods, Trader Joe's or Woodman's
- Continue to shop at Willy st coop or Whole Foods (but my husband would miss the convenient pick n save)

- Be really disappointed, on behalf of people who RELY on the Park Street Pick N Save. (I myself do 95% of my shopping at Willy St. Co-op East, and unless the co-op opens a new

•	Although we do most of our shopping elsewhere because we want local, sustainably grown food and good organic produce, we use the full-service for quick runs to get all types of food.
•	We currently use the Pick 'n Save for buying toilet paper, paper towels and the occasional household product and milk run. We rely on Trader Joe's, Willy Street, and Whole Foods for our food-shopping needs. This is a pattern we developed during the extremely scuzzy days of Copps, which lasted for the year or so after we moved here. So we already experience the inconvenience of not having a full-service supermarket nearby. The question for my household should be more like: What would you do if there were a full-service grocery store on Park Street? The answer would be: Shop there! In fact if it were a Willy Street or Trader Joe's, we would walk there and shop there exclusively. If it were a large-chain grocery store with well-stocked produce, organic food, ethnic foods, and gluten-free sections, we would shop there almost exclusively.
•	I'd shop outside the neighborhood but would probably look at moving. There are not enough options for the Bay Creek and surrounding neighborhoods.
•	Continue to shop as we do. We do not use the Pick 'n Save for much. •	Would love to see a Willy St Coop like on the north side. Or perhaps two stores, side-by-side: something like what's there now plus a coop.
•	It's important that something is there for those who don't have the ability to go elsewhere (e.g. access, income, etc).

The answer offered that this is an issue for business (developer and supermarket owner) to solve and that there is little the city has power to do to ensure a store at 1402 or nearby other than what it has been done (require that whoever gets the goahead to purchase 1402 include space for a store) is an abnegation of the city's communityserving responsibility. Since when did the marketplace ever take the needs of individuals, especially low-income individuals as its motivation for decision making? The foolhardy buildnow-and-plan-later tactic the city proposes to embrace here on and publicly-owned land is in direct contradiction to its commitment to serve its poor and to redress income- and race-based inequities. The presence of a full-service market at 1402 or nearby should be a priority. Making sure that the market that is built meets the needs of the area should also be a priority and not left to guesswork. Selling off 1402 should be placed on hold until the city performs a market analysis to determine what size, type, and number of supermarkets would best serve the neighborhoods of South Madison. And not just a market analysis; the city should be performing a needs assessment with respect to 1402 concerning other public needs this publicly-owned site can be used to address, such as housing, public health, retail and incubator space, community meeting/education. The plans we've seen so far begin and end with the needs of the developer to enrich its business. There are not enough options for the Bay Creek and surrounding neighborhoods. Think it is of the utmost importance that the city not just require that others (developers) take charge on this matter, but that our officials put their money where their mouth is and ensure that South Madison has ongoing equitable and affordable food access.
