As promised, I'm providing updated language for the section of the neighborhood plan that addresses public pathways. Let me know if you have any questions. Thanks!

In order to increase accessibility, wayfinding and connectivity among residents in the neighborhood, a network of primary pedestrian pathways that intersect and connect with public sidewalks are recommended. The pathways should accommodate all users, including people in wheelchairs and those with limited mobility. The green dotted lines in the illustration to the right identify the recommended locations for these new pathways. These primary pedestrian paths increase flow and permeability in and out of the neighborhood and conveniently connect people to each other and to local amenities and resources such as green spaces, parks, Monona Bay, the community center, community gardens and play spaces. Because the area serves many residents, many of whom are very young, elderly and/or have disabilities, it is not recommended that these pathways be public. Rather, their intention is to connect people already living within the neighborhood with one another and the broader public sidewalk system.

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
