RE: NOISE ORDINANCE VARIANCE APPLICATION: SOUTHEAST RECREATIONAL FACILITY REPLACEMENT PROJECT CONSTRUCTION ACTIVITIES, 715 W. DAYTON STREET, DFDM Project No. 14L2T

Campus Colleagues,

This memo serves as notification of our official application for a variance of the Noise Control Regulation ordinance MGO 24.08 to allow construction outside the ordinance timeframe (M-S 7AM-7PM & Sunday 10AM-7PM). The Southeast Recreational Facility (SERF) project, located at 715 W. Dayton Street, is requesting to run two (2) 10-hour shifts for seven (7) days a week for three months. The request is due to the construction of the concrete pool wall and not meeting the design requirements, hence having to be replaced. This variance is requested to ensure the overall project meets the contract completion date per the approved schedule. You are being notified as a building within a 300' radius of the SERF project site.

Variance Noise Request Times: Monday – Saturday 7PM to 7AM, Sundays 7PM to 10AM

Schedule: Monday-Sunday, June 12 – August 16, 2019

Purpose: To rebuild a portion of the concrete pool wall. The contractor requests this additional time to deliver the project within the approved schedule.

Construction Methods: The majority of work will be internal to the building footprint and will require equipment typical of vertical concrete construction. Fork lifts, front loaders, excavators, skidsteers, concrete pump, dump trucks, and concrete trucks will be equipment used. Trucks will access the site via the public street network to W. Dayton Street from either N. Park Street or N. Lake Street.

Noise: Equipment backup alarms, redi-mix trucks, saw cutting, pneumatic tools, jack hammering, dump truck loading, and associated access to the site.
