PURPOSE OF THE SURVEY

• Document the history of communities underrepresented in past historic preservation efforts:

- African American - Latino

- First Nation - LGBTQ+

- Hmong - Women

- Identify resources with historic integrity and significance that are potentially eligible for:
 - City of Madison Landmark or Historic District
 - State & National Registers of Historic Places
- Increase public awareness of the history of Madison's diversity

SCOPE OF THE SURVEY

- Not a definitive history of the City of Madison or the six underrepresented communities
 - Intended to be a "living" document updated as more information becomes available
 - Anyone can contact City of Madison and Wisconsin Historical Society to provide additional information to update property records
- Does not cover all underrepresented groups
 - Future surveys can be conducted for other underrepresented communities

EVALUATION OF RESOURCES

City of Madison Historic Preservation Ordinance

Section 41.07 Designating Landmarks, (2) Standards

- A. It is associated with broad patterns of cultural, political, economic or social history of the nation, state or community.
- B. It is associated with the lives of important persons or with important event(s) in national, state or local history.
- C. It has important archaeological or anthropological significance.
- D. It embodies the distinguishing characteristics of an architectural type inherently valuable as representative of a period, style, or method of construction, or of indigenous materials or craftsmanship.
- E. It is representative of the work of a master builder, designer or architect.



EVALUATION OF RESOURCES

State and National Register Criteria for Evaluation

The quality of significance in American history, architecture, archeology, and culture possessing integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association, and:

- A. Are associated with significant historic events
- B. Are associated with the significant persons
- C. Embody the distinctive characteristics of a type, period, or method of construction, or that represent the work of a master, or that possess high artistic values, or that represent a significant and distinguishable entity whose components may lack individual distinction
- D. Yield important historical information




