

Project Background

The City's Planning Division is leading an effort to update the South Madison Neighborhood Plan adopted in 2005, with adjustments to the geography to focus on the area south of Wingra Creek, including the Town of Madison. The Plan will also include recommendations in the areas of community services, economic development, housing, land use, parks and open space, public infrastructure, redevelopment, safety, and transportation.

Public engagement with area residents, nonprofits, institutions, and property owners will inform all phases


of the planning process. The City will strive to make the planning process accessible and relevant to stakeholders in South Madison, based on the value that those who are affected by a decision have a right to be involved in the decision-making process. The Planning Division will partner with entities to reach southsiders in ways that work for the community. We will use a variety of methods described below, placing special emphasis on reaching people of color and residents living with lower-incomes.

The planning process will adhere to the IAP2 (International Association of Public Participation) spectrum to select the level of public participation and appropriate tools to gather, consult, involve, and collaborate with the public.

Anticipated Public Participation Methods

- Neighborhood Ambassadors: southside residents working in the area to listen, engage, and communicate relevant issues and perspectives with residents and to the planning team
- Neighborhood Action Teams: 2-3 neighborhood action teams consisting of 8-10 southside residents from underrepresented populations with the role of providing candid input on issues, strategies, and plan recommendations



 Neighborhood Responders: Coalition building of small and larger groups to discuss strategies and ways to implement the Neighborhood Plan
