These words resonate with me in regard to my passion for delving into the rich history of the lives of others—real and imagined—and the complex context woven by time and space, across a diverse range of cultures spanning the globe.

Currently the Content Marketing Specialist for Taliesin Preservation (a UNESCO World Heritage site and the home, studio, school, and 800-acre estate of Frank Lloyd Wright), I am also 2019 guest faculty at The Highlights Foundation and Hugo House, plus a 2018 *We Need Diverse Books* mentorship finalist.

I believe each individual helps to create a small piece of the society we live in. And my passion for sustainable agriculture is what launched my freelance writing career seven years ago. I recently transitioned out of my role as the digital editor of *BRAVA*, a Wisconsin-based magazine created by women for women and subsidiary of Nei-Turner Media Group. In particular, I adored overseeing the culinary, arts, fashion and beauty coverage in those past roles and I have also previously contributed print, photography and video content for other media outlets around the country such as *BLK+GRN*, *Madison Magazine*, *Big Life*, *Spectrum* and *Hobby Farms* Magazine—all while maintaining side gigs as a fitness pro, a 2016-2017 national cycling WomenRide4Change Ambassador and 2017 World Food Championships Top Ten Finalist judge.

I also was one of four expert panelists for local organization Social Media Breakfast's LIVE Social Media Audit in June 2017 and a solo presenter on how to build a personal brand online during the October 2018 event. In addition, I developed a freelance writing workshop series at Arts and Literature Laboratory (a Madison nonprofit arts incubator), which has also now been offered through the Madison Public Library system for almost two years. And thanks in part to the popularity and success of my writing series, I was asked to be a mentor for the 2018 Madison Public Library Takeover Program—helping to support a novice programming team develop and launch a community event at one of the public library branches. Plus I was 1 of 50 poets this Spring to have a poem selected and transformed into a public artwork by Edgewood College Graphic Arts for display along a Madison Metro Transit Route via Madison Metro Bus Line Poetry Project .

The Madison Arts Commission (via Arts & Literature also funded a one-day digital branding training facilitated by me for "creativepreneurs" in May 2019. I'm also excited to have become a volunteer program assistant this summer for *We Need Diverse Books* (https://diversebooks.org/about-wndb/) and am very much looking forward to teaching a "Marketing for Writers" online course for Hugo House (hugohouse.org/) in October.

In addition, I consider one of my greatest successes as a writer thus far to be the fact I've become a respected digital marketing strategist for writers and other creatives. In fact thus far in 2019, I've taught at 3 different writers conferences and/or retreats (The Highlights Foundation; University of Wisconsin Madison's Writers Institute; "Write to Publish" at Ooligan

Press/Portland State University) —and will be teaching at *Wordsmi*th (hosted by The Loft Literary Center in Minneapolis) this November. So even though I do not have a full collection of my poetry published yet, it's affirming to still be recognized as a social media and online promotion expert by novice writers, established authors and other publishing professionals.

I'm excited to submit this application for consideration to become Madison's next Poet Laureate. Thank you for continuing to create opportunities which reflect diverse narratives and inclusion in our city!

Truth lingers. And multiplies.




Round Robin
