**Board of Park Commissioners Dogs in Parks** February 12, 2020

My name is Karen Matteoni. I am a park supporter and avid park user. I served on Long Range Planning of Parks and on the boards of 2 friends of parks organizations. I have led park cleanups, plantings and worked to get playground equipment for children. I taught elementary school. Today I am speaking as a park user and a neighbor of a park.

I was shocked to read in the newspaper that "there has never really been a problem with the dogs." There are problems in the parks which are not being addressed. Parks allowed dogs to be on-leash in Yahara Place Park as a pilot and declared "The pilot was a success" but staff never reached out to neighbors of the parks. A staff member said they didn't reach out to us because "Neighbors don't want anything in parks." Owners are letting their dogs run off-leash and on long leashes are making the park and surrounding streets and neighborhood unpredictable, unpleasant and unsafe for other park users. The park can be tranquil one moment and then dogs interfere with other parks users.

I am awakened in my home by dogs barking in the park as early as 5:30 in the morning with my windows closed. Most of the dog owners are respectful of park users but many people have chosen to let their dogs run off-leash and in packs. Off-leash dogs have barked, growled, fought, run in packs, chased on-leash dogs, invaded picnics, checked out sunbathers, and intimidated other park users, including infants and children.

Enforcement is a major problem. There are only a few park rangers trying to enforce rules at 274 parks. If a ranger catches people with their dogs off-leash, they normally give them a warning rather than a ticket. Only 52 tickets were issued in 2018 for all of our 274 parks. Each day I see at least one off-leash dog in the park. Warnings have been ineffective. Tickets could improve compliance.

I have been going to public parks all my life in Chicago, New York, national parks and Madison. In all those years, I was never charged or attacked by dogs except in City of Madison Parks. Yes, we have a problem in our parks.

As the Board of Park Commissioners, you need to provide reources for enforcement and resolve the problems before more parks are open to dogs. We don't let people buy a car and drive wherever they want without any training, testing, enforcement or insurance.

Going on swings for young children, older children, and adults

Using other playground equipment for young and old (slides, climbing equipment, games) Baseball

Football

Throwing horseshoes

Soccer

Flying kites

Fishing

Climbing trees with low branches

Climbing trees with ropes and other equipment

Croquet

Singing

Dancing

Tightrope walking on ropes attached to 2 trees

Kubb (A game with wooden pegs and blocks)

Throwing frisbees

Bocce

Making bubbles

Tossing balloons

Putting in and taking canoes and kayaks onto Lake Monona

Exercise routines including running forward and backwards

Planting trees, shrubs, and flowers

Metal detecting and digging around tree roots

Maintaining plantings

Collecting trash

Riding on hoverboards on path along Lake Monona

Swimming at new water access points

Badminton

Cross country skiing

Snowshoeing

Going from the park to the lake to ice skate or ski

## Activities with dogs

Walking with 1-3 dogs on-leash on the sidewalk, on the grass, on the path along Lake Monona, on the street next to the park and on private property on the residential side of the street Being pulled by 1-4 dogs on a leash

Walking with 4 dogs on-leash on sidewalk in the park (professional dog walkers?)

Walking with 1-2 dogs off-leash on the sidewalk, on the grass, on the path along Lake Monona, on the street next to the park

Walking after 1-2 dogs which have leashes not held by the owner

Walking/running with dog off-leash on the grass

Sitting at a park bench or on the ground with 1-2 dogs on leash

Throwing balls to 1-2 off-leash dogs with or without a ball launcher

Dogs barking, growling at other dogs and people

Dogs fighting

Standing around while 1 or more dogs run off-leash

Training dogs

Yelling at dogs

Cleaning up feces and putting in trash (or left in the bag on the ground when trash cans removed for winter)

Watching dogs defecate without cleaning up
