Conceptual Approach

What would it take to create a sacred public space and time in Madison in which Blackness is not threatened but guaranteed safety, refuge, and protection? Centering Blackness in this way does not just happen. It requires an intentional and consistent commitment from a community. To receive and witness this experience, one must understand it as an honor—a sacred ritual in which that which has been feared and suppressed is given reverence as wisdom for the world 's healing.

Project Description (400 words or less)

YWCA Madison in collaboration with the Black Thought Project and with the training and guidance of our 2020 Racial Justice Summit Opening Keynote Alicia Walters together with a local team of Black co-creators including artists Brooklyn Doby, Opal Tomashevska and YWCA racial justice and restorative justice practitioners Alyssa Ivy, Kyra Johnson and Jasmia Hamilton envisions to co-create a Black Thought Wall (BTW) interactive art installation here in Madison, Wisconsin.

The construction of the wall will be coordinated with Operation Fresh Start as an envisioned partner, as well as determined by conditions in its final location.

The team of Black co-creators mentioned above will be trained by Alicia Walters and plan to collaborate with additional Black local artists here in Madison such as musicians, spoken word artists and dancers with a particular attention to Black youth.

BTW co-facilitation will be provided by the Black co-creators team, integrating the support of local Black guest artists as mentioned above. BTW aims to offer a co-facilitated experience for Black community members, and in particular Black youth to express reflections on topics that center their healing, love, and liberation.

Non-Black space keepers will be also trained by Alicia Walters in stewarding this space and experience of Black Thought and sacredness. We are aiming to offer this BTW experience sometime in the first week of October. YWCA Madison as a local organization with a longstanding location in the South side will partner with other peer organizations in the community to steward this offering to Madison.
