- CDD gathered feedback on the needs in the Madison community that could be addressed through two upcoming COVID-19 Relief RFPs. We asked the community to <u>rank</u> the following needs:
 - 1. Funding for violence prevention
 - 2. Support for children and youth (ex. youth employment support, youth programming, etc.)
 - 3. Funding for eviction prevention and housing assistance
 - 4. Household/Basic needs
- Survey participants were also asked to provide specific ideas as to how they think the topics above should be addressed in the community.

Ranking of priorities:

- 1. Funding for eviction prevention and housing assistance
- 2. Support for children and youth (ex. youth employment support, youth programming, etc.)
- 3. Household/Basic needs
- 4. Funding for violence prevention

Additionally, responders also identified support for mental health, food, internet, and utilities as community needs.

Support for Eviction Prevention and Housing Assistance

- Provide funding for rent, low income home owners' mortgage payments, security deposit assistance, first month's rent, utilities, and bills.
 - Many sources have already been depleted
- Urgent need, provide funding as quickly as possible. Concerned about the end of the eviction moratorium.
- Work with trusted agencies and make funds available to those who have not been able to access funds. This includes undocumented immigrants.
- Create as few barriers as possible for families to get assistance. Do not require an eviction notice.
- Fund housing counselors for those who have already been evicted.
- Funding for hotels stays for those who have been evicted.
- Educate landlords about the need for flexibility to prevent eviction. Incentivize landlords when possible.



Support for Children and Youth

- Youth employment training
- Day programs and activities
- Access to Internet
- Virtual learning support, tutoring
- Mental health (support counselors, youth groups)
- Must meet basic needs (housing, food, clothing, safety)



Support for access to Household/Basic Needs

- Coordinate with pantries and agencies already providing food to also provide other supplies
- Provide gift cards or vouchers for families to purchase needed items
- Have locations in communities that are easy to access such as neighborhood centers, JFF, and other trusted organizations. Consider using bus transfer points, libraries, and schools. Maybe a mobile option too.
 - Hours beyond 9-5.
- Increase communication on where households can get items.
- Make sure marginalized community members can access support. This includes undocumented individuals, immigrants, people of color.



Support for Violence Prevention

- Mental health
- Restorative justice
- More funding for shelters and emergency hotel stays for those fleeing domestic violence.
- Employment and training for youth
- Meet basic needs like housing, food, etc.
- Support programming in communities to keep youth engaged
- Peer support
- Community Response



Other thoughts/comments re: Community Needs

- Significant concerns about eviction moratorium being lifted.
- Access to support for families who can't access Shares for childcare subsidies
- Provide a universal Basic Income
- Assistance with utilities
- Support for those with mental health and substance abuse concerns
- Household and organizations need more masks, sanitizer, access to testing
- Free metro rides again
- More support for immigrant community, undocumented community, and people of color

Next Steps

RFP #1 – Eviction Prevention and Housing Assistance

- This RFP will specifically support housing assistance and eviction prevention. *Includes the immigrant population
- Anticipated RFP release date: Tuesday, January 12, 2021
- This RFP will make available up to \$750,000, comprised of:
 - COVID Relief Fund (\$500,000): Established by the City of Madison Common Council, these funds are dedicated to support community-based efforts to prevent evictions or provide other types of housing assistance to meet needs caused by COVID-19.

CDBG-CV Funds (\$250,000): Awarded through the CARES Act, these dollars are available to support "emergency grant payments" allowed under federal CDBG guidelines, and able to cover expenses for up to six consecutive months, to providers of items or services that help meet basic needs such as food, clothing, housing, and utilities.
