FACTS ABOUT THE CITY OF MADISON ADVISORY REFERENDUM RELATED TO THE MADISON COMMON COUNCIL

- When you vote in the <u>April 6, 2021 Spring Election</u> you will find <u>four advisory referendum</u> questions on the ballot asking about the structure of Madison's Common Council.
- The questions ask about alderperson pay, the size of the Common Council, the length of alderperson terms, and whether alderpersons should be subject to term limits.
- These questions are part of a multi-year City initiative to investigate whether changes to the structure of Madison's government could improve representation and engagement for all of Madison residents.
- So far, City efforts to consider answers to these questions have included a comprehensive review of the history of Madison's government by an eleven-member Task Force on the Structure of City Government, culminating in a Final Report with recommendations to the Mayor and Common Council.

- This referendum is advisory only. It will not bind the City or make any immediate change. Instead, the City will use this information to gauge the voter's interest in pursuing these possible changes, which would take further action by the Common Council or the voters to implement.
