Education

Olbrich Botanical Gardens' Education staff have worked throughout the pandemic to produce meaningful virtual programs.

- 29 adult classes and workshops have been held to date. Most have been virtual, with a handful of in-person classes.
- 775 registrations have been received for the January through May classes and programs.
- 3 virtual book clubs have been held
- 1,204 visits, mostly virtual and a few in person so far this year for education programming
- 'Nature's Best Hope' the lecture by Professor Doug Tallamy, was attended by 264 individuals on March 25. It was 3rd in the 5 part lecture series, 'A Gardener's Call'.

Volunteers

Customer-facing volunteers are slowly returning to shifts at the Greeter Desk in the lobby and the Growing Gifts store, which will really help staff get other work done. Volunteers will return to the Outdoor Gardens later in April. Conservatory Docents will return to the Bolz Conservatory on Wednesday mornings as a trial. Volunteer Services Manager, Marty Petillo, reports that many volunteers are eager to return to their jobs, that some are still hesitant, and, even fewer may never return. Staff members have been saddened by the deaths of some long-time volunteers during this year of pandemic.

Marty has begun interviews and orientations for new volunteers – some have been on a 'wait-list' during the pandemic year.

Gardens

Parks Forestry assisted with the assessment, pruning, and removal of trees too large for Olbrich staff to manage. The large honey locust outside the Atrium is a sad loss – but Horticulture Director, Jeff Epping, is looking forward to selecting replacements (maybe oaks), and replanting. The honey locust was growing in a 'tree well' where it was planted probably in the late 1970's or early 1980's which contributed to its decline. We will do a better job with locations for replacement specimens.

Bolz Conservatory staff were thrilled with more than 7000 visitors in February who viewed the Orchid Escape displays. Even with the capacity limits required during the pandemic, many in our community were able to escape to the tropics during February.

Production greenhouses are full of spring and summer annuals – as well as a number of perennials propagated from seed. As of now, staff are preparing to begin hardening the spring annuals that to plant outdoors in late April.
