Dear Dan and members of the golf committee,

It was great to "see" you on the zoom call this week. Thanks for your service to the City.

My husband and I would like to pose a few questions as the community evaluates the positives and negatives of the proposed donor investment in Glenway.

We have been Madison residents since 1970 and 1977 respectively. We lived on the South and East sides initially where we used Monona and Yahara extensively. We moved to the Westmorland neighborhood in 1986 where we reside today at 4110 Euclid Ave. As you might expect we have used Glenway and Odana extensively over those 35 years. Our son and daughter grew up playing Glenway, taking lessons from Bill Scheer. Both went on to play High School golf practicing and playing matches at all of the city courses. Our son worked for Bill at Glenway and for The First Tee at Glenway in its maiden year. My husband Rick now plays with MARGA. We are very invested in Madison golf and very grateful for this wonderful resource that the City makes available to its residents.

We obviously have a special affinity for Glenway having played countless rounds there, having taken scores of lessons there, cutting through next to the club house on our daily walks, sledding, skiing, snow shoeing and the like. We even had our 5ft. Christmas SnowMan stolen one year only to find it prominently displayed on the 1st green.

Of course we are selfishly concerned about preserving Glenway so that we, our family, our neighbors and our friends can continue to enjoy it. But given the precarious state of public golf in Madison over the last 10 years, we are most concerned about a process that could put this precious resource at risk of losing City ownership, stewardship and sponsorship. After observing the meeting last week we developed a series of questions that we hope will be considered and answered as the proposal is evaluated.

- 1. Is this likely to increase or decrease the City's ownership and control of Glenway long term?
- 2. Will this process have the unintended consequence of making Glenway a political target?
- 3. How will this affect operating costs of Glenway?
- 4. How will this affect the golf revenue of Glenway?

- 5. How will green fees be affected? Will additional user fees come into play?
- 6. Can we estimate the long term risk of losing current paid users (golfers) by closing the course for a year and/or by changing the course?
- 7. Who assumes liability for accidents on the course between various user groups? Will all users be required to pay a fee to use the park putting them in the same status as golfers? If not, how does this affect liability for users and the city?
- 8. Most importantly, have you critically (and realistically) assessed the opportunity to use the St. Andrews model and vision at Glenway? St. Andrews has 6 and 1/2 golf courses there, ocean shoreline, multiple club houses, facilities, more resources and vastly more acreage making multiple use more realistic and manageable. They were able to withstand the existential crisis of rabbit farming vs golf on the property in the 1500's. Not sure Glenway has the same breadth to work with, nor does it have the backing of Parliament.
- 9. While we recognize there is always room for improvement, given the delicate and precarious status of our golf courses over the last decade. Does it make sense to take this risk with one of the most diversely used, financially successful and historically significant courses in Madison?

I am a golfer and golf on weekends mainly and golf at Glenway probably more than any other Madion golf course. I golfed at least 10 times at Glenway last year & it is my favorite of the Madison golf courses.

In past years, we occassionally have to wait to have people move out of harm's way while we are golfing at Glenway. Theses are people who are out walking on the course (often with dogs, on the trails and on the edges of the course itself) especially on the Southern (bike/walking trail) and Eastern (woods & bike/walking trail) parts of the golf course. My concern is that more pedestrians on the course will mean more folks who are clueless about golf safety and stray off any designated trails to take short cuts, etc.

Can you show us clear maps of where walking trails will be placed and discuss how golfers and walkers won't cause problems for each other? Will fences/markers/signs keep walkers from wandering onto the course?

I don't have a problem with walkers on designated paths as long as it is safe for everyone.

If a walker gets hurt from a golfer, is the city liable? Is the golfer liable? Is the walker liable? It would be good to clearly consider what happens if someone gets hurt.

Also, is it true that the golf course could be closed some part of, or all day on Sundays, for example?

If so, that is less opportunity to golf and since I don't walk there, but I golf there, it would be less opportunity for me. Can you address golf course availability changes?

Also concerning for me is that after the redesign, it will be really hard to get a tee time at Glenway and I am concerned the cost per round will increase dramatically - I have the madison golf card and have a concern that Glenway will become relatively expensive to play there. I believe I have been paying around \$15 to walk 9 holes at Glenway (with the City Discount card).

Please recognize in your presentations to the public that the course changes will cause increased golfing pressure, it will become harder to get a tee time and there will be increased costs for

greens fees in the future. I would like to see a gradual slow increase in rates over what they had been. Less than \$1 per year over 2020 rates.

In spite of all my concerns, I am in support of accepting the offer to upgrade the course. It is a unique opportunity from a well respected golf course developer. I have played at Sand Valley and know how special that golf course is. I just want Glenway to retain its charm with old oak trees like on the 5th and 6th holes.

I am most concerned about mixed use and safety of pedestrians, many of whom don't understand golf safety considerations.

I am sad about not being able to play there in 2021 and know that it will be harder to get a tee time in the future and it will cost me more.

I really hope the quaint charm of Glenway can'be maintained and I can golf there again someday.

In the short term I will have to play at Odana or Pleasantview as they are the closest to my home.

I truly want the project to succeed and I think it will. I am just in the grieving process I guess and will get over it eventually.

Just please keep it safe for pedestrians and golfers alike & don't shorten the course. There really isn't as much room there as you think.

But I do fear the Parks Department is so eager to move on this proposal that perhaps they are not clearly communicating a response to some of the possible concerns that Glenway golfers have. My questions:

- 1) I have read about the revenue gap that Madison golf courses have experienced. How does this proposal specifically improve the financial situation?
- 2) What are the current metrics (# of rounds per day/capacity rate) at Glenway GC and will this proposal improve on these metrics?
- 3) Specifically what problems exist at Glenway that this proposal will address?
- 4) I have read quotes from the developer that he foresees a future at Glenway where non-golfers could enjoy the park for activities such as kite flying, etc. Can someone answer how this would reasonably work?
- 5) How would golfers and non-golfers interact safely?
- 6) What revenue impact would this have on Glenway if the course reduces golf play times to allow for non-golf recreation time?
- 7) What other options do non-golfers have in the area and is it the desire of the City to reduce activities at other parks? I have golfed more than 20 rounds at Glenway annually for the last 35 years and have been a Madison resident for more than 40 years. I am very concerned about the proposed redesign of Glenway. My concerns include:

- 1. Closing the course for 2021 following an abbreviated 2020 schedule deprives golfers of a desired venue.
- 2. The course is currently very playable for golfers of all skill levels, is affordable, and accessible to city residents.
- 3. Approval of a redesigned course needs to factor in on-going maintenance costs of the dramatically changed course.
- 4. A course with multiple non-golfer users put person in danger of being hit with errant golf balls and potential liability issues.
- 5. Potential conflict exist when golf ball end up in the proposed environmental planting areas-will golfers be able to retrieve the ball and be subject to criticism for damaging plantings?
- 6. Glenway is a financially sound Madison Parks course with players of all ages with MARGA and Juniors programs.
- 7. A better choice of this proposed course redesign is Yahara which has struggled financially, has much more land area, and is in need of fairway upgrades with common flooding problems. The back nine at Odana is also a possible candidate with frequent fairway flooding.
- 8. The "enterprise status" of Madison golf courses in which PILOT payments drain course resources is not a fair or equitable status. This designation doesn't exist for the heavily subsidized Overture Center or Monona Terrace with a much more affluent clientele that the golf courses. The Parks Dept. should work on getting this golf course status removed.

Golf was so popular last year it made a profit, despite a late start and reduced number of tee times. Glenway was busy every day. The vast majority of Glenway players aren't (or can't) driving east. Many aren't skilled to play Odana, a course they view as too long.

I am a co-chair of the City of Madison IPM Policy Review Task Force, whose original charge was in part pollinator protection. Our work was interrupted last spring by the COVID pandemic and has not resumed. We were working on language to reduce pesticide use and incorporate other landscape practices on City of Madison property, which includes golf courses. The redesign document does not directly address pesticide use, but I thought it would be an opportunity for the Madison Golf Subcommittee to look at examples of golf courses that eliminate pesticide use and incorporate management practices that would be an example for future Madison golf course designs. Here is potential language to address pesticide use for this project:

Guidelines for pest management of golf courses should take into account environmentally safe and sustainable management of landscapes, natural areas and facilities using best practices with the goal to both control pests and to eliminate, minimize or reduce, where possible, chemical pest control methods and choose least toxic methods to control pests. The City of Madison Golf Subcommittee is committed to protecting citizens and biodiversity of ecosystems. Therefore, pest management practices will take into consideration their potential impact on human health, water quality, and non-target species including pollinators.

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
