Park corridor. The city recognized Wingra Creek as a boundary for the South Madison Neighborhood Plan. I realize I may have contributed to the notion that the southern part of Bay Creek was effectively connected to the northern portion of D14, but it's not a point of view shared by residents who live there.

Both maps, however, miss an opportunity to add the residents on Carver St and other streets in the Town of Madison in the Arboretum to District 13. I write to express my concern that the two redistricting options (5a and 6) currently under consideration by the committee will split the residence halls on the UW-Madison campus into two different aldermanic districts (Districts 5 and 8). This will impact an important community of interest and eliminates the historical practice of having a single alder represent those students who live on the UW-Madison campus.

There has been a long tradition of keeping all UW-Madison residence halls – which today serve more than 8,000 residents – in a single aldermanic district. The obvious benefits to this include the following:

- A single alder can represent the needs and concerns of all our residence hall residents as their primary focus; shifting some residence halls into a district primarily made up of single family homeowners could lessen the likelihood that the concerns of those UW-Madison students will be heard by the Common Council
- Treating UW-Madison residence hall students as a single "neighborhood" ensures that the "voice" of those neighborhood residents is not diluted. This is consistent with the approach taken with a number of other communities of interest across the city and meets one of the key objectives the committee is asked to take into account
- Maintaining a single aldermanic district that represents all students living in UW-Madison
 residence halls recognizes that there are both constituencies and issues unique to the UWMadison campus that have benefitted greatly from having a single alder focus on and represent
 those interests. The current alder representing District 5 made similar comments in yesterday's
 Wisconsin State Journal article ("Proposed City Council districts would split up dorms, 'crack the
 student voice'")

Similarly, keeping as many off-campus students within District 8 would ensure that those students would continue to be represented by someone who has the interests of UW-Madison students as their primary focus. This is particularly important for the Spring Street/College Court area, which is heavily populated by students of color and low-income students.

I understand that there are several potential changes that could be made to the redistricting maps that would keep UW-Madison's residence halls and many of our off-campus students in a single aldermanic district without creating significant changes to the maps overall. I strongly encourage the committee to review these potential changes and choose one that maintains the traditional "student district" that has given voice to UW-Madison residence hall students for many decades.

We, the undersigned Bay Creek residents, urge the committee to promote Concept 6 for redistricting.

Concept 5A, which would reassign the "tree streets" and rest of the area south of Olin in Bay Creek to District 14, would, in our opinion, have a deleterious impact on the Bay Creek neighborhood. We understand the need to change district boundaries based on population changes in neighborhoods/districts and to accommodate the addition of the Town of Madison to the city. However neighborhoods are more than population counts. Neighborhoods are living entities that arise from lived patterns over time. They can be easily destroyed, but they cannot be created by dropping an administrative line on a map.

We further believe that removing the "tree streets" and the rest of the area south of Olin from District 13 does not fit the established federal and state legal criteria for redistricting.

- It does not enhance the participation of communities of color and communities that primarily use a language other than English in either District 13 or 14.
- It makes the awkward and sprawling District 14 even more awkward and sprawling.
- It divides communities of interest (COIs), including a Neighborhood Association and elementary and middle school attendance areas.
- It introduces the administrative confusion of a single neighborhood divided into two districts and served by two alders.
- It ignores the physical barrier/natural boundary that Wingra Creek creates between the tree streets and District 14.

We further object to the rushed process by which the city has solicited citizen input on redistricting. Many neighbors remain unaware and others confused by the proposed changes. There should have been neighborhoodand district-wide meetings to explore the impacts—both the pros and cons of redistricting. There should at the very least have been more time for citizens to digest the proposed Concepts and respond to them. This would have enabled Madison citizens to engage in an informed democratic process.

1. I'm glad that Metropolitan Place Condominiums in the 300 block of West Washington Avenue and West Mifflin Street remains in the same alder district as other condos on the south side of West Washington Avenue under both concepts. I live in Metropolitan Place and can confirm that our issues and concerns are aligned with theirs.

2. In Concept 6 the far southwest corner of District 6 extends along the railroad tracks to Broom Street. I reviewed the maps at Central Library on Saturday, September 25th. The current District 17 includes the Ridgewood, Autumn Lake, and Greater Sandburg neighborhoods and the East Towne area.

Both current redistricting options separate Autumn Lake and portions of Ridgewood by placing them in district 3. In addition, our current alder Gary Halverson has been redistricted out of his elected district. Gary has worked diligently to improve the neighborhoods and the revitalization of East Towne.

I looked over the proposed redistricting maps and noticed that both maps- and Map 5a in particular- split some special overlay zones and other key planning areas. Splitting State St between alders, for example, will mean potential developers and business owners who have not selected a location will need to talk to two alders. Dear Committee Memberrs,

On behalf of the board of Elderberry Neighborhood Association, I'm writing to inform you that we have voted as a board to encourage you to recommend the <u>adoption of Option 6 for redistricting the City of Madison</u>. (Note: I found the map comment process very difficult to use, so I did not make our comments there. I'm hoping this email reaches you by the deadline.)

As for our rationale, we feel Option 6 would give a better voice to the needs particular to the far west end of town, beyond the beltline, because it joins similar areas. Elderberry is much more similar to Blackhawk, Junction Rd. and the greater Cardinal Glen/Birchwood neighborhoods than is Elderberry to the area between the beltline and Gammon Road (an area included under Option 5a).

Please note that ENA is a very large area geographically. Landwise, it covers a major portion of District 9 under either option. Over the past 10 years it's grown from a small number of units to many hundreds. And over the coming 10 years it could in fact double in population, as much of it is currently still under development. We often feel that because we're so far out, and have so little of interest to offer the rest of Madison, the city regards us as inconsequential. We hope the redistricting process can correct this to some degree by giving us full representation.

Among the factors that support the adoption of Option 6 are the following:

1. Large amounts of future development. Like the area to our south, and somewhat to our north, we are likely to be adding many more housing units over the next 10 years. Being joined with the area east of the beltline would put us at a disadvantage as that area is already fully settled and dealing with a much different set of issues related to development.

2. **Shared school district.** Most of the Opt 6 area falls within the Middleton-Cross Plains District, as opposed to MMSD. Uniting us in one district gives us a solid base for building community on a variety of issues.

3. **Small number of different neighborhood associations.** Working with only a few NAs, as opposed to the many involved with Option 5a, allows for greater focus and ease in cooperation among NAs.

4. **Similarity of land use, primarily sf residential.** Distribution of land use west of the beltline is more similar under Option 6 than under Option 5a. There are some apartment buildings but there's no commercial property west of Junction Rd.

5. Strong Asian concentration. Approximately half of our neighborhood is Asian -- Indian or Chinese. And almost 5% of the units are ones where English is not spoken at home. Many are not citizens, but rather are here on VISAs. We need representation for this uniquely challenging situation.

6. **Huge number of retention ponds and few parks.** West of the beltline the city has required a large number of retention ponds -- and built few parks. This presents the people in Option 6's area with a special set of problems regarding vegetation management, safety, and recreation.

7. **Policing.** The Option 6 area is one with low demands on police services. We have almost no violent crime and therefore make few demands on the police department. However, because we're viewed by drivers as wide-open "in-the-country" territory, the Option 6 area has big problems with speeding and rotary accidents.

8. Agricultural districts. The areas north and south of Mineral Pt Rd, west of the beltline, encompass a large amount of agricultural land, some privately owned and some owned by the University. This is a unique situation not shared by residents to our east.

9. **Traffic patterns.** Our neighborhoods are being laid out to allow large amounts of pass-through traffic off major routes like Mineral Pt Rd. (This is being sold as "walkability," even the there's nothing here to walk to). Narrow residential streets being used as highway extensions is a major problem shared within the Option 6 area.

Thank you for your work on this issue and consideration of our concerns.
