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2021 Data Analysis	
Street Use Events:	The substantial difference between the 2019 totals and this year's can be attributed to COVID restrictions in place prior to June 2nd and a number of "series events" - Farmers' Market, Concerts on the Square, King St. Live, etc that delayed their start date, relocated or were cancelled.

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Park Events:

While the number of event days in Madison Parks this year is similar to 2019, a significant number of these days were permitted through "Community Park Events" permits. This is related to neighborhood and community groups looking for outdoor space for gatherings and events.

Community Park Events, Classes in Parks, Day Camps in Parks:

These three categories were heavily utilized by the public before and after COVID restrictions were lifted. "Day Camps" and "Classes" permits were introduced specifically to address the restrictions and assist in business recovery efforts. We will be recommending that some version of these permits be offered post-COVID.

- In addition to looking at the end-of-year data for events, we are beginning to review the information and data we have been gathering from the "Carts in Parks" programs and events. There was a steep learning curve, but the lessons learned have and will provide a solid basis for looking at the future of vending in Madison Parks. We also learned of new/different ways we can open parks to engage communities we may not have worked with before.
- Carts in Parks also gave us an opportunity to work collaboratively with other City agencies. It
 was good to utilize the knowledge, talent and skills of our colleagues to develop the program
 and work on issues together as they came up.
- While we are spending some time reviewing the past year, we are also planning for next year's event season. We're hoping for a bit more "normalcy" in the year to come, but we don't necessarily event know what that means anymore . . . regardless, we have sent reservation notices to long running events, asking them to confirm their dates for next year and making sure we have those dates and locations on the books before 2022 shelter reservations open November 9th.
- Also in the future, we hope to have an online Park Event application that will be ready for
 use by event organizers in early 2022. This has been a long time coming and we're excited
 that it's nearly here. Once this is in place, we will work with IT to get more of our simplified
 permit applications online as well.

Recreation Services (Tracey Hartley):

Aquatics/Goodman Pool – (Jon Landsverk):

The 2021 Aquatic season ended for the pool on August 29th and for the beaches and splash pads on September 6th.

- Planning has already begun for the 2022 season
- A complete resurfacing of the Goodman pool will be starting at the end of September

Rangers (Joanne Austin):

Wow! It was a busy summer for everyone in Parks and that was especially true for the Rangers. Since mid-July, the Ranger Program has been short two permanent Rangers. On top of that, two hourly rangers were out on leave for multiple weeks. However, despite these challenges Rangers have been flexible with their schedules and all have worked very hard to continue to serve the numerous customers who enjoy our beautiful parks system. The summer is now winding down and we'll be transitioning into the Fall and Winter season. The job announcement for the permanent positions has been posted and we hope to have these vacancies filled by late October or early November. Along with general patrol duties, which greatly consists of educating the public on Park rules and policies, permit compliance and assisting reservation customers, one of the biggest challenges faced by rangers has been making contact with those experiencing homelessness. There have been approximately 65 homeless contacts made in the last 30 days alone. We continue to stay in close communication with Outreach resources, who are doing their best to connect with these individuals. Our next obstacle will be moving our belongings back into our former Ranger office at the Goodman maintenance building. That will be a temporary move, until we can return to the Lakeside office building again next summer.
