Woulf explained how the funding of the proposal will be reflected within the Healthy Retail Access Program.

Members had questions clarifying how city investment would be protected, the relationship of the UW Center for Cooperatives and Willy St. Co-op to the Allied Community Cooperative through the duration of the project.

Woulf provided FPC members with an overview of the Council's budget request items from previous years. The Executive Capital budget is already released, which includes the Healthy Retail Access Program. The operating budget would include the remaining items including Double Dollars and Community Gardens operations, SEED grants, etc.

Rhodes-Conway expressed an interest into looking at a potential line item for

pollinator habitats as outlined in the PPT report. Also, funding for staff training would be useful too. Woulf expressed desire to have funding for paid internships.

This WG has had some challenges gaining momentum, but we did have a very productive conversation in the spring. We agreed on the following:

- the PEWG seeks to find mechanisms for both out-reach and in-reach, and to help all the WGs achieve them
- the PEWG is NOT the publicity wing of the MFPC
- it is important that MPFC WGs do not use only out-reach and in-reach tools that the members of the WGs themselves would use (such as the internet or phone calls to city staff or other means more readily available to people with more privilege)

we need to be careful not to confuse active out-reach and in-reach programs with inclusive out-reach and in-reach programs

 we also need to keep in mind that we don't have the same audiences for all issues, and therefore need to choose our initiatives

plus it is important to consider what the existing network nodes are, and what the existing network "umbrellas" are, in understanding an effective out-reach and in-reach strategy – including considering who is left out by those nodes and umbrellas, and how that might effect the success of out-reach and in-reach

We suggested that WGs could strive for better out-reach and in-reach through a couple of means:

 that the PEWG devise an engagement analysis tool for the WGs, which might be something as simple as a checklist of questions such as

Who is your audience? How will you reach them?

Who do you need to hear from? How will they reach you?

- each WG should have a good look at the equity tool that has been developed

by the public health community

> The Local Food Committee met in July and August to review the final Public Market District business plan (prepared by our consultant, Project for Public Spaces) and the racial equity report. The Committee also discussed, edited and approved the Resolution requesting the Common Council to approve the business plan and the racial equity report. The Resolution includes a number of items directing the LFC and staff to work with partners on an implementation strategy for the Public Market project, develop a plan for a

broader Market District, ensure that the goals of racial equity and social justice are integrated into the models, and continue to monitor real estate

opportunities in the District.

The Committee will meet again on October 1. The Common Council will likely consider the resolution at their October 6 meeting.

August: Our application for Community eligibility at 3 more schools has been approved for the 2015-16 school year. All students at Lindberg, Sandburg, and Hawthorne will be eligible for breakfast and lunch each school day.

Enrollment for the 2015-16 school year stared on August 4, 2015. We have 7,834 students who have been direct certified for meal benefits. We will be aggressively tackling the application & approval process over the next several weeks to insure that our students receive the meal benefits they are eligible for.

We will be adding a new menu feature this fall for our customers. The Nutrislice menu system will provide nutritional information and pictures of the menu items. This will be a great tool for nutrition education and highlighting locally produced food. There is also a phone App to make this information more accessible to families. We will be introducing the Nutrislice system with our elementary menu this fall.

September: Our schools opened on September 1, 2015. We have approximately 1,800 students on temporary Free or reduced status from last year that will need to complete the meal benefit application process prior to October 14. Our schools will be communicating with them over the next several weeks to get the application process completed. Over 8,000 of our students were Direct Certified for meal benefits without having to fill out an application.

REAP Food Group is working with us on a fall promotion called "Wisconsin Wednesday" that will feature locally produced items for our garden bar. We plan to start this in October.
